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### Wootton Players Youth Group

The Wootton Players are an amateur drama company based in Wootton who have been in



existence for just over 30 years. We put on a panto each year in the local community centre which is always very popular in the village and is watched by some 900 people each year across 5 performances. We also put on a Murder Mystery every September and occasionally other plays. Historically some 6-8 children aged between 11 and 16 appeared in the junior chorus in the pantomime. Talking to the children and their parents some 4 years ago, it was evident that they really enjoyed being part of the group and involved in the pantomimes and got a great deal out of it. However, they were asking whether they could continue to meet even when we were not rehearsing for the panto (which is typically between October and early February) and whether their younger friends and siblings could also be involved.

We therefore decided to set up a Wootton Players youth drama group for children aged between 8 and 16 which would meet every Monday evening during term time in the community centre from March through to the end of September. The objectives of the group were:

- To improve the children's general acting, singing and dancing skills and improve their stage presence to help them when they appear in pantomimes
- 2. To raise awareness of all the activities involved in putting on a drama production, e.g. set design and painting, sound, lighting, costumes, choreography.
- 3. To help instil a love of drama and the theatre: and
- 4. (Most importantly) To have fun!

We do not turn anyone away although we do have a Behavioural Policy and Code of Conduct which they must sign up to. We do not charge for children attending but recognising our commitment to support the young children in the village we set aside some monies from the profits generated from the pantomimes to fund the rental and certain other costs to run the youth group. We are also fortunate to have some 8 people on the Wootton Players committee who are school teachers, teaching assistants or who are involved in the local church (and who therefore have the appropriate DBS checks and awareness of the importance of

safeguarding procedures) who willingly give up their time to run the drama group.

In the first 2 years some 12-15 children regularly attended each week. In 2016 the children put on a performance of a short play "Stoppit" which was watched by some 60 members of the village. The numbers have continued to increase with some 25 children now regularly attending and in June 2017 the group put on 2 performances of an abridged version of Bugsy Malone on Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> June which was watched by some 150 people. 2 of the older members of the group choreographed the dances, all the children are actively involved in designing and building the set and identifying costumes, with other children operating the sound desk and lighting.



The group continues to go from strength to strength. It is clear that they really enjoy being involved, it gives them a sense of purpose and provides them the opportunity to learn new skills and keeps them off the streets. We can see the difference the group makes when it comes to panto time. Last year, we had some 15 people in the junior chorus (and could have had more if we had relaxed the age limit), 2 of the older members of the group choreographed all the dances whilst another designed the set, whilst 2 other children operated the sound desk and follow spot, and others were involved in helping back stage.

For us what makes it all worth-while, are the many comments received from parents thanking us for giving their children such confidence to perform and grow as individuals.

We continue to be dependent on the goodwill of many people. We are delighted to have recently received a donation from the Wantage Junior Showstoppers who unfortunately have disbanded. We are incredibly grateful for the donation and will ensure that the money is put to good use to ensure that our youth group remains alive and kicking in Wootton!

# BARTHOLOMEW PLAYERS The Constant Wife

by W. Somerset Maugham

29th November-2nd December 2017



The excellent 1920s set appropriately dressed set the tone for this production. This play is as relevant today as it was then and showed no signs of being 'dated'.

The stalwart long-suffering butler, **Bentley** (*Steve Ashcroft*), in his 40<sup>th</sup> year with Bartholomew Players, was well cast, maintaining dignity and discretion

Mrs Culver (Deborah Lisburne Diacon) was stately and splendidly haughty in her attempts to protect her daughter, Constance, from the philandering of her husband. Her other daughter, the mischievous Martha Culver (Kate Astley O'Connor) was very strongly played and was a good foil to Constance. Her associate, Barbara Fawcett (Sarah Miller) was well cast and the clipped accents of both added to the twenties feel.

**Constance Middleton** (*Gillian Somerscales*) triumphed in the part. She was commanding throughout, taking every situation in her stride and gave a brilliant all-round performance.

Marie-Louise Durham (Sandra van der Linde) was cunning in her naivety, being very demonstrative and flirtatious.

**John Middleton** (*Joe O'Connor*) whilst having an affair with Marie Louise, was assured and increased in intensity and agitation as the plot unfolded, with some interesting awkward hand gestures, when his temper surfaced.

**Bernard Kersal** (*Ed Miller*) was very credible and relaxed as Constance's would-be lover, totally unflustered by the frenzy that surrounded him. **Mortimer Durham** (*lanto Wain*) was a good blustering foil to the beleaguered John and the relaxed Bernard.



The whole play maintained the humour of the twenties with good costume changes (of which there were many) Given that Denise Santilli is relative new at directing, she certainly is a force to be reckoned with. Her direction was excellent with effective use of the stage and very nice touches throughout.

This production maintained the high standard of the Bartholomew Players we have now come to expect. Well done to everyone involved.


